







This course explores how to develop "ethno-mathematics" curriculum from everyday experience associated with subsistence living. In particular, you will be active participants along with elders at the Academy of Elders Camp for eight days. Elders, instruc-

tors, and participants will work collaboratively as we identify authentic and culturally appropriate "ethnomathematic" practices that can be adapted to schooling. You will be expected to identify such practices and to develop and implement curriculum during the fall semester. Of particular interest will be body measures, traditional patterns and their meaning, numeration, and orientation. After the academy, you will develop instructional units appropriate to the grade level that you are teaching. In addition, a second course will be offered with an emphasis upon science. These courses will be closely aligned as we develop a common philosophy and approaches to working with elders, framing the curriculum in a culturally appropriate manner, and connecting math and science content.





The teachers who enroll in the course will develop instructional units according to the grade levels they are currently teaching. After the ten-day academy, the teacher will be able to generate an applicable curriculum within their local school. Educators will be required to pay the fee for the courses, which is \$50 each, and transportation to Fairbanks and return. Many school districts reimbursed teachers for these costs last year. This summer's experience for our Interior Native teachers will be to learn the dynamics of incorporating Alaska Native traditional culture into culture-based curriculum.



Brief Description. This course explores the possibilities of everyday Athabascan culture and language, particularly summer Culture and Elder Academy Camp, as one basis for developing curriculum and pedagogy. Students will be active participants along with elders at the Cultural Camp, Elders Academy at the Old Minto Cultural Heritage and Education Institute for ten days. By participating in various subsistence activities, storytelling, and elder seminars students will document, analyze, and translate this knowledge into school related curriculum and pedagogical approaches. Participants, and elders will work collaboratively in the process of translating Indigenous knowledge into school-based curriculum materials and produce a model for either developing Indigenous curriculums or have a plan for classroom implementation.
